An Introduction to Advent: The Courage of Hope (The Rt. Rev. Deon Johnson)

In this season of Advent, we are called to embrace the courage of hope. Not the kind that denies the darkness, but the kind that enters into it. God's most profound works often unfold in obscurity—creation from chaos, resurrection from the tomb, the incarnation in the stillness of night. Advent does not rush to the joy of Christmas but lingers in the holy tension of waiting. It bids us to slow down, to notice where God is poking, provoking, and prodding us toward deeper relationship—with ourselves, with one another, and with the divine.

Advent is not just a countdown as we rush headlong towards Christmas; it is an invitation. It calls us to hold back the mad dash toward the manger and walk instead the slower, sacred path of preparation. Light a candle against the shadows. Read the prophets. Dwell in the questions. Sing the hymns of longing. Pray with the saints who waited before us.

For Jesus is coming—into our world, into our lives, into our gloom. And with him, he brings the fierce, transforming light of courageous hope.

May our anticipation of hope be holy.

May our waiting be pregnant with possibility.

May our expectation be buoyed in our longing.

For surely God dwells with us in this waiting place.

Land Acknowledgment for the Diocese of Missouri (updated 7/2022)


In humility, we recognize and acknowledge that we in the Diocese of Missouri worship and live on the traditional ancestral lands of the Osage Nation, the Illiniwek/Peoria Tribe, the O-Gah-Pah (Quapaw) Tribe, the Otoe-Missouria Tribe, and other First Peoples. We recognize our mutual dependence upon and benefit from this land; we proclaim our solidarity with and our debt to the Peoples who first claimed and improved this land as their home. We acknowledge our complicity in the process of colonization that dispossessed the First Peoples from their ancestral lands. We affirm our commitment to stand with indigenous communities today and henceforth as they seek justice and resist continued threats to their sovereignty and humanity.

We are also cognizant that the history of The Episcopal Church is intertwined with the history of colonialism and slavery in the United States. More than four centuries ago, the first enslaved Africans were brought to the Americas, and two centuries ago enslaved and indigenous persons contributed to the exploration of this state by Lewis and Clark. Our state's history is entangled with both the Missouri Compromise making this state officially a slave state, and the case of *Scott v. Emerson* that petitioned for Dred and Harriet Scott's emancipation. We acknowledge the tragic legacy of slavery in our diocese, and the blood, sweat, and tears of enslaved people that soak the earth beneath our feet in Missouri. This legacy persists today as we continue to work towards racial justice, equity, liberation, and community, here in Missouri and across The Episcopal Church.

THE BIDDING FOR ADVENT

The Season of Advent takes its name from the Latin word adventus, meaning "coming" or "visit." Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas and ends on Christmas Eve. For Christians Advent is the beginning of the liturgical year. During Advent we prepare for and anticipate the coming of Christ. We remember the longing of our Jewish ancestors for a Messiah and our own longing for, and need of, forgiveness, salvation, and new beginning.

Presider Welcome to a special season called Advent, which means "coming." It is the time we get ready for Jesus to come at Christmas. We also remember that God's people longed for the Messiah long ago, and that we long for God's love, forgiveness, and new life today.

Deacon Let us confess our sins against God and one another.



THE GOSPEL Matthew 1:18-25

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, O Christ.

Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way. When his mother Mary had been engaged to Joseph, but before they lived together, she was found to be with child from the Holy Spirit. Her husband Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly. But just when he had resolved to do this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, for the child conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet: "Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel," which means, "God is with us." When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son; and he named him Jesus.

AN ADVENT AFFIRMATION: FORM B *Please stand as you are able.*

The Presider leads the assembly in an affirmation of faith. Originally the entire service was viewed as our confession of faith. But, since the Sixth Century, the Church has recited either the Nicene Creed or the Apostle's Creed at the Eucharist. The word creed comes from the Latin credo for "I believe" or "I lend my heart to." Creeds tell a deeper "truth" that goes beyond "facts."

Presider In this season of waiting and wonder, we affirm our faith in the God who comes— Creator, Christ, and Spirit—whose light is born anew in every heart and throughout all creation.

People We believe in God, the Weaver of all creation, who spun galaxies from starlight and shaped the earth from clay; whose breath gives life to every living thing, and whose promise is planted deep within the waiting world.

We believe in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh, Light kindled in the darkness, who came as a child of heaven and earth, revealing the face of God in the heart of humanity. He walked among us as grace upon grace, embracing our joys and our sorrows, and in love stronger than death he opened the way of life everlasting.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, wild as wind, gentle as breath, the Fire who dances through creation, awakening hearts, stirring dreams, and drawing all things into the circle of God's love.

We believe in the Holy Trinity—Source, Word, and Breath of Life, God beyond us, beside us, and within us—whose light shines in every shadow and whose coming we await with hope and wonder.

Until Christ is born anew in every heart, we journey on in faith, watching, waiting, and welcoming Love into the world once more. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE: FORM A

Prayer changes people. Prayer is not about changing God, but about changing us more into the likeness of God. Collectively and individually we offer the hopes and desires of our hearts to God. The Deacon, when present, introduces the prayers.

In our Diocese of Missouri, we pray for the people and ministry of Trinity Episcopal Church in St. James and Kevin, their Priest-in-Charge; and Pat, their Deacon. In our companion Diocese of Puerto Rico, we pray for St. Bartholomew the Apostle Mission in Lares. In the Anglican Communion, we pray for The Anglican Church of Burundi. Fill your faithful people with the radiant light of truth, that we may be made one in faith, hope, and love. Christ be our light.

People Shine in our hearts.

Leader You who delivered your people from the misery of bondage in slavery to the land of promise; set us free from enslavement to division, disunity, and distrust in our public life and labor. Illumine those in authority with the light of vision, that they may lead the peoples of the nations to greater unity and concord. Christ be our light.

People Shine in our hearts.

You who patterned the stars and called the sun into being, who appointed the moon and chartered the cosmos. Pattern the hearts of people everywhere to see in each other the beauty of the universe and the splendor of creation, that divisions of race, class, gender, and ethnicity may dissolve into one common humanity. Christ be our light.

People Shine in our hearts.

You who shower comfort and hope to the lowest, the lost, and the least, shower the light of compassion on the sick, the sorrowful and the suffering, especially those we name: Israel, Palestine, Iran and the Middle East, Ukraine, Russia, Haiti, Sudan, and Libya; our immigrant and trans siblings; the Cass, Baker, Swift and McLean families, Mary, Patty, Jim, Joanne, <u>David & Canon Doris</u>, Adele, Brianna, <u>Thelma & Raymond</u>, John, Basil, Arthur, Kingsley & Ramona, Kathy, Michael, Warren, Deacon Barbi, Deb, Kaplan; all in prison and their families; and those affected by violence and oppression in all forms. Help us to be your compassion and hope in the world. Christ be our light.

People Shine in our hearts.

You who welcome into the brilliant light of eternity the souls of those who have died; welcome those whose lives have been cut short by violence, warfare, and strife. Shine the light of hope on our faithful dead, especially those we now name: all slain in Sudan, the Middle East, and Ukraine; Brendan Cass, Stan Baker, Timothy Swift, Cathy

McLean, those 132 lives taken by gun violence in the city of St. Louis in 2025 and all who die at the hand of another, or by their own hand. Christ be our light.

People Shine in our hearts.

Leader You who delight in the complexity of creation and the splendor of each creature; help us to delight in the

diversity of the earth, our island home. Inspire your people to care for the earth and its creatures and repent and

return when we abuse, misuse, and neglect our fellow creatures. Christ be our light.

All May Christ, the Morning Star who knows no setting, find us ever burning with the light of love,

the spirit of truth, and the wellspring of hope; that following the way of Jesus and filled with the flame of the Holy Spirit, we may be a holy people whose lives and living inspire, incite, and inflame your world with compassion and care. Through Jesus the Christ, the light of the world.


GATHERING AT CHRIST'S TABLE

THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER: The Great Thanksgiving Eucharist Prayers for Advent: Form 3

The Eucharistic Prayer, or Great Thanksgiving, is the prayer of the Church to invite Christ to be present in the elements of bread and wine. Now we come to the second act in the drama with the Liturgy of the Table. It is based on Jewish Fellowship meals, particularly the Passover observance. But this second half of the service is not communion in and of itself. It is the whole service, both acts of the drama, that make up the Eucharist.

Presider Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.People It is right to give thanks and praise.

Presider It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Creator of all that is seen and unseen, for in you, light and darkness find their harmony, day and night each reveal your glory. In the beginning,

your Spirit moved over the deep, and from silence and shadow you brought forth the beauty of creation. You

shaped us in your image and wove your breath into our being. Though we have wandered and grown forgetful, still you call us to dwell in the mystery of your presence, to wait, to watch, to hope.



Presider Blessed are you, Holy One, for in Jesus Christ, your Word took flesh and made a home among us. In him, your hope was kindled, your peace whispered into being, your love poured out without measure, and your joy made complete. All Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Come, O Spirit of Promise, and rest upon these gifts of bread and wine, that they may be for us the Body and Blood of Christ; nourishment for our waiting, and strength for our journey. Come, dwell within us, that we who share this holy meal may bear the light of hope, breathe the peace of Christ, embody love's compassion, and rejoice in all that gives life. As we await the fullness of your reign, teach us to live as children of your Advent; awake and watchful, grateful and expectant, trusting in your promise that both night and day belong to you.

Through Christ, with Christ, and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, now and for ever.




Those participating at home may, if they wish, say this prayer during the time of Communion:

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
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THE POSTCOMMUNION PRAYER Please stand as you are able


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THE SENDING
